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Executive Summary

Mayor and Council,

Pictured on the front cover of this month's report is the presentation of a \$5,000 donation by President Karie Jordan, Treasurer Diane Potts, and Secretary Steve Pitts of The Full Circle ACTION Civitan Club of Civitan International. This donation is the first step in their fundraising journey to purchase and install playground equipment and amenities in BlackGold Park that make it more accessible to those with physical disabilities. We appreciate the work of Full Circle ACTION Civitan and their partnership with the City on this project.

For those that are not familiar with Civitan and what they do, they are an international organization dedicated to creating opportunities for people to serve, socialize and learn through local clubs. In addition to promoting community involvement, these clubs work to better their communities by helping:

- People with Developmental Disabilities
- People in Need
- People with Physical Disabilities
- Youth; and
- Conservation.

As you review the following departmental reports, I hope you take notice of the number of different projects that have been completed or are in progress. Allow me to take a moment and highlight a few that are in the report and add a few others that I believe are informative.

- The sub-base and gravel for the new access driveway to the sewer plant has been completed. This drive, connecting Barber Street to the current drive, will be upgraded to a solid surface before the project is completed. The completed drive will allow crews to begin the cleanup on the temporary access easement across the Barrett property. We are thankful for the Barrett's and their willingness to work with us on this important project.
- The Hwy 75 Project continues to progress at a steady pace. We will continue to see traffic delays and construction-related heartburn throughout the project, but thankfully ODOT and the contractor have been responsive to our needs and requests. While the traffic delays on Hwy 75 have been better than expected, unfortunately the traffic on Elwood has significantly increased with regular significant delays in morning and evening traffic. This traffic pattern will likely continue throughout the project.
- Congratulations to Brian Pacino, Sydney Fleetwood and Clint Morgan on their promotions to Corporal!
- Additionally, we have completed the final interview process on our latest police applicant process. We expect to fill both open positions, pending the background examination, from the candidates that were interviewed.
- Sales tax last month was down 0.7% across all funds.
- Glenpool recently hosted the annual Affiliate Forum for Keep Oklahoma Beautiful. Thank you to Jess

Hale, his Public Works Team, and the Conference Center team for their work hosting this event!

- If you have not had an opportunity to review the social media stats, I would encourage you to take a look. Our internal and external teams do an amazing job creating, publishing, and tracking posts for four different city departments across multiple platforms. In March these posts garnered over over 250,000 impressions and 115 new followers.

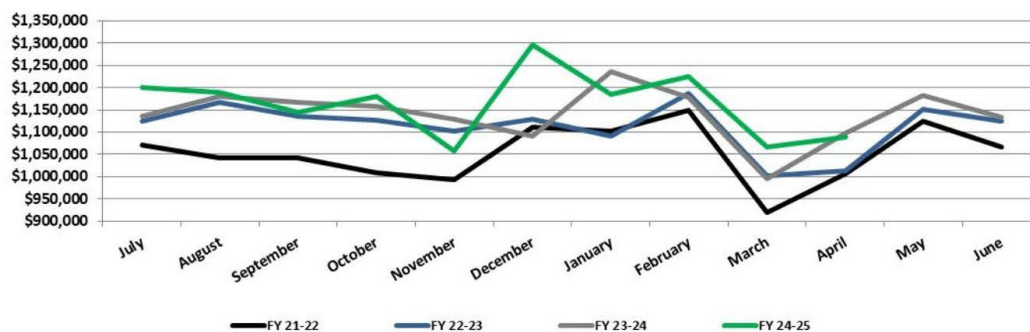

SALES TAX

FY 24-25 Combined Sales Tax for all funds in April totaled \$1,090,028, 0.7% lower than FY 23-24 revenues for the same period. Further details on April financial results will be reported next month after the accounting period is closed.

GENERAL FUND REVENUES

FY 24-25 General Fund revenues through March totaled \$12,598,501, which is \$278,839, or 2.3%, higher than FY 23-24 revenues for the same period. Year-to-date revenues are \$442,728 above budget., with Sales Tax, Investment Income, Intergovernmental, and Miscellaneous revenues all up.



GENERAL FUND EXPENDITURES

FY 24-25 General Fund expenditures through March totaled \$11,530,764, or \$95,030 (0.8%) higher than FY 23-24 expenditures through the same period. These expenditures were 9.8% under budget year-to-date.

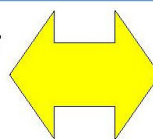

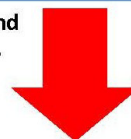

SALES TAX REVENUES—ALL FUNDS



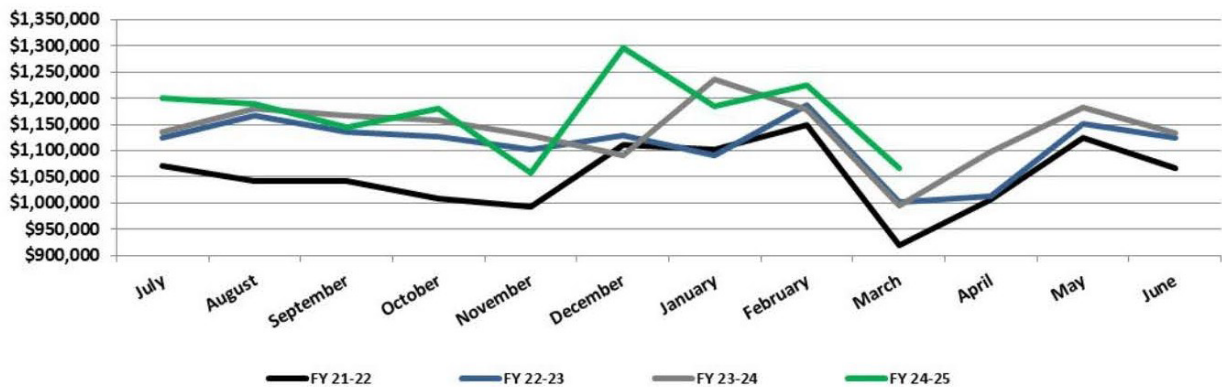
FY24-25 year-to-date Sales Tax collections through March were 1.7% above budget, and 2.7% higher than FY23-24 collections for the same period.

FY 24-25 Actual Compared to Previous 3 Fiscal Years Actual

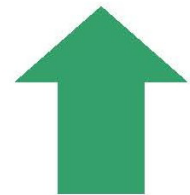
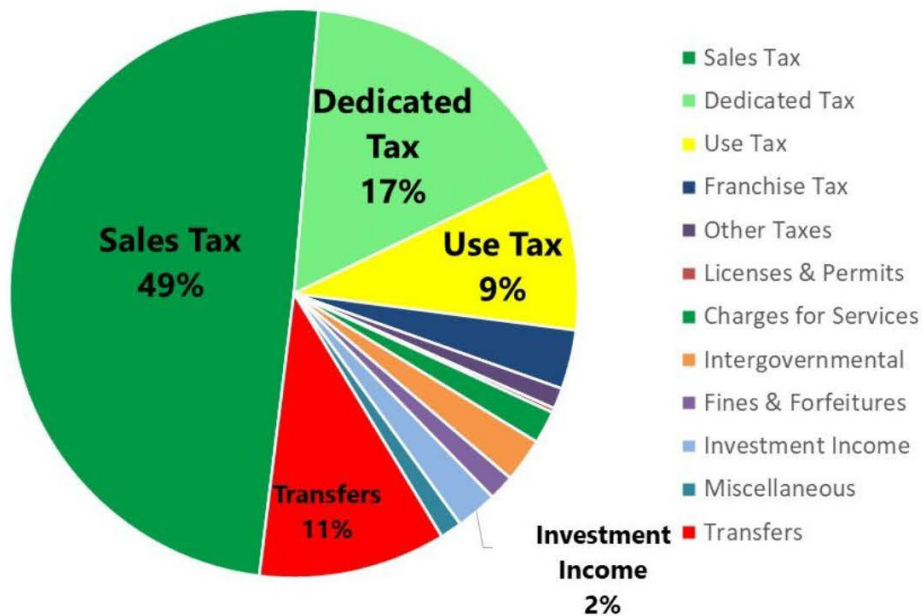

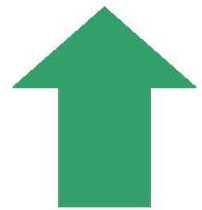
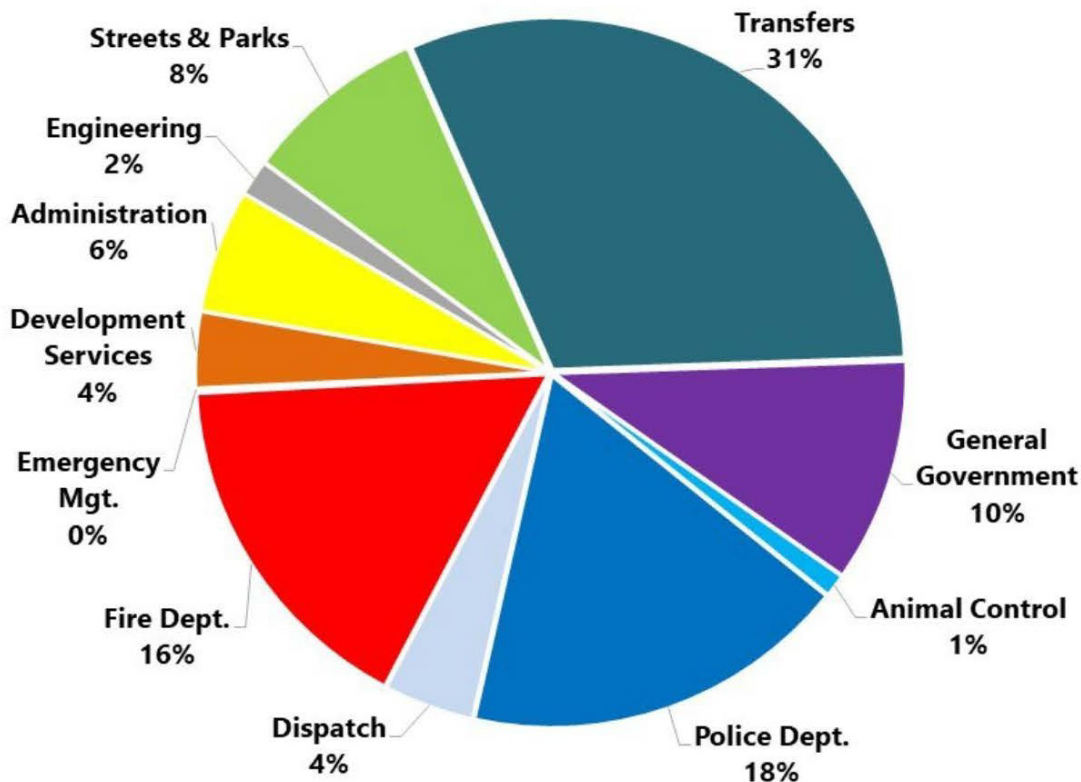

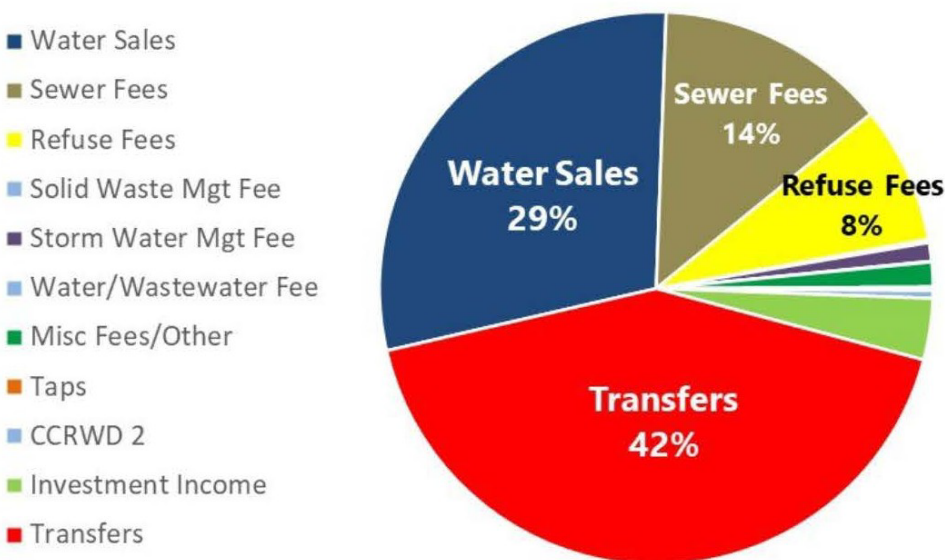

GUSA YTD Revenues by Type



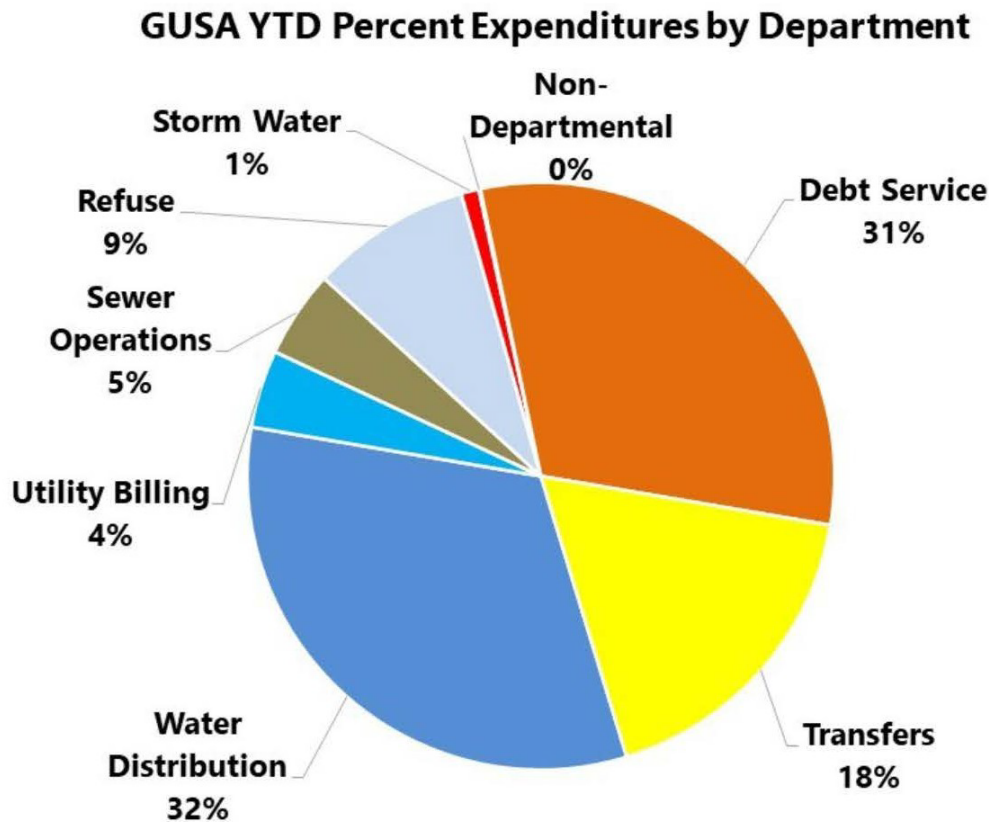

Development Services

Listed below are current development related activities within the City of Glenpool through the month of April 2025. These activities listed include Projects Under Construction, Planning Applications Under Review, Approved Projects Not Under Construction, Building Permits and Inspections, and Code Enforcement Activity. The most recent activities are highlighted in **red**.

Commercial/Industrial Projects Under Construction:

1. **C & C Office Complex** – A proposed 2,672 sf office building located 459 E 151st S. The existing single-family residence will be converted into an office building.
2. **Brown Veterinary Clinic – S75 Business Park** – A proposed Veterinary Clinic located at the southeast corner of W 161st St. S and S Broadway St.

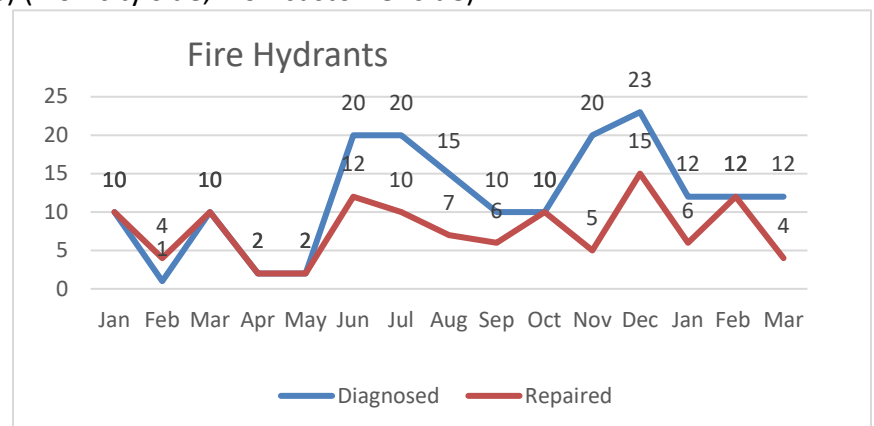
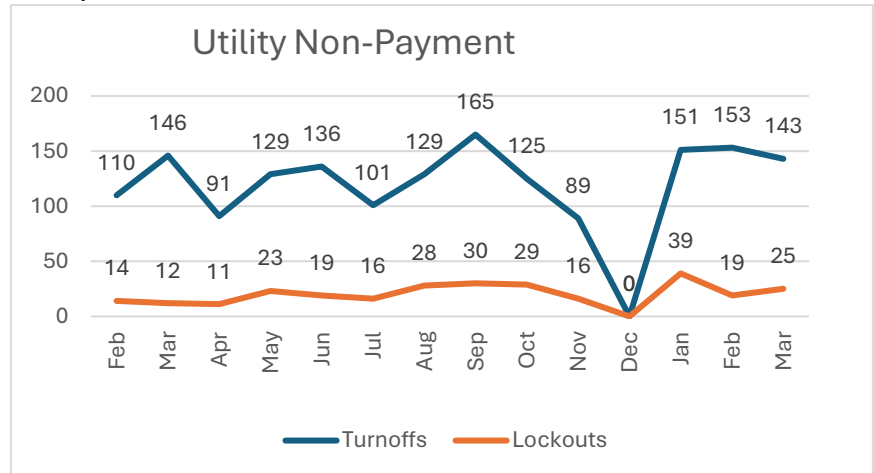

- Increased Hydrogen Peroxide from 10 to 40 gpd to reduce odor and raise DO
- Only 3 of the 8 lateral lines are functional at this time
- Running three 4" Venturi pumps as needed to raise DO in lagoon
 - The one remaining pump has parts on order.

 - Blower 1: non-operational... needs motor & blower and will remain offline
 - Blower 2: Blower has been taken in for repairs
 - Blower 3,4: functional, 4 will be serviced soon for alignment issues.

- Booster Pump station on US75 at 131st has had its pin hole leak temporarily repaired. The station is now mostly isolated from distribution. Awaiting further instruction from city engineer on path forward.
- New connections will all receive Mach10 meters as we cannot get new RG3 meters.
- Elwood Lift Station has demonstrated that it can not keep up with flow during rain events. We are purchasing a used bypass pump to use here whenever it rains.
- Staff attended the ORWA Annual Conference. Lots of new ideas and products were investigated and possibly implemented in the coming months.



WWTF Build – UPDATE

Lots of activity has been occurring at the plant site. Two job trailers have been set in place for contractors, engineers, and city staff. The access road is taking shape even with all the rain we have been experiencing. The foundation for the digesters has been poured and some of the larger storm drains have been installed. The cavity for the SBR structure has been dug out. All of the old race track aeration ditch and the subsurface

chlorine contact basin has been removed. Headwalls and culverts have also been constructed for on site water drainage from adjacent neighborhood.



Disc Golf Course - UPDATE

are happy that it turned out as well as it did. We are still attempting to open the course to the public on June 1. The parking lot area will be cleared in the coming weeks.



Keep Oklahoma Beautiful

Keep Oklahoma Beautiful is statewide nonprofit organization that works to improve affiliate communities in Oklahoma through litter prevention, waste reductions, and beautification. One event they put on yearly is the Affiliate Forum. Glenpool was honored to host the Affiliate Forum this year as part of Keep Oklahoma Beautiful's Gather in Glenpool event. Mayor Calvert gave the opening remarks and Glenpool's Public Works Director, Jesse Hale, gave a presentation on what the City is doing to Keep Glenpool beautiful.



Arbor Day Celebration Report

The 2025 Arbor Week Celebration took place on March 24-29 this year. The City of Glenpool and a group of thirty 6th graders celebrated on Wednesday March 26th. During this daylong event, the students got to take part in some educational

classes at city hall dealing with storm water pollution as well as a demonstration on how the type of landscape used in an area can drastically affect retention of rainwater.



But it wasn't all fun and games. Each of the students planted a sapling in the disc golf course at Morris Park. Sumac, Dogwood, and Pecan trees were planted in strategic places to help build up the aesthetic nature of the course. Although each sapling is less than 2 feet tall now, in several years, they will begin to show their beauty, and in 20 years they will create an entirely new challenge for the course players.

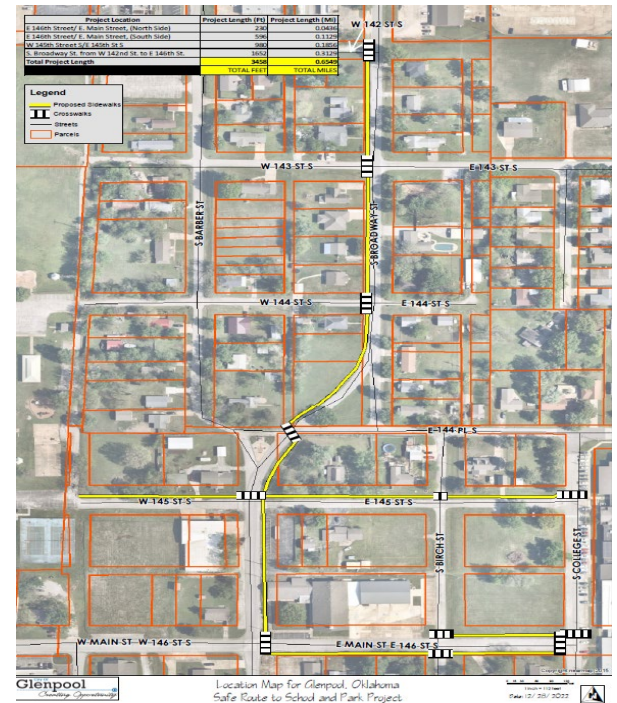
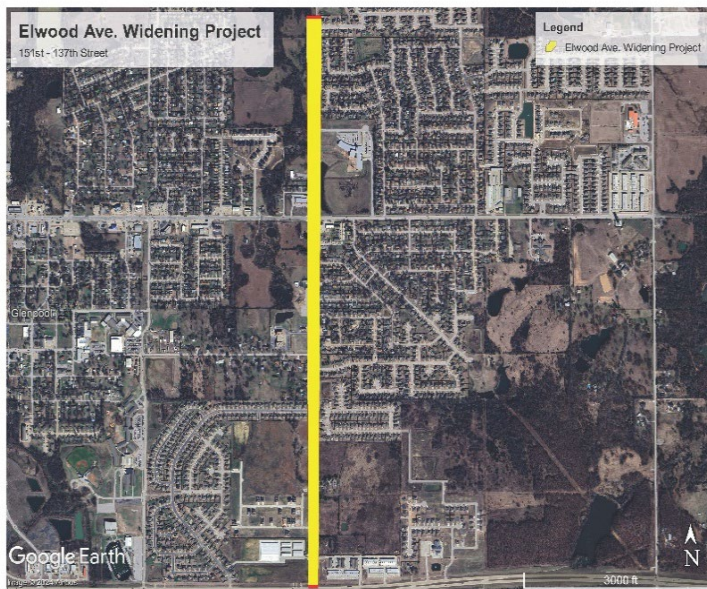

This report summarizes the activities of the engineering department and infrastructure projects in the City of Glenpool during the stated period.

Glenpool Safe Route to School Project JP#3810404

The project establishes an ADA-compliant sidewalk network linking Glenpool Public School to Black Gold Park.

- Total cost: \$1,202,760 (City match: \$240,552 - paid).
- Kimley Horn was selected as the consultant.
- Contract signed by Kimley-Horn
- Awaiting Notice to Proceed.



Elwood Ave. Widening from 151st – 137th Street, State JP#36939(05)

Expands 1.42 miles from two to four lanes, improving pavement, traffic flow, safety, and aesthetics.

- STP grant: \$902,880 (City match: \$225,720 - paid).
- RFQ issued November 19, 2024; responses received from 10 firms by December 17, 2024.
- Qualification-based selection is in progress.

TAP Grant Sidewalk Improvement Project on Warrior Road. JP#3802804

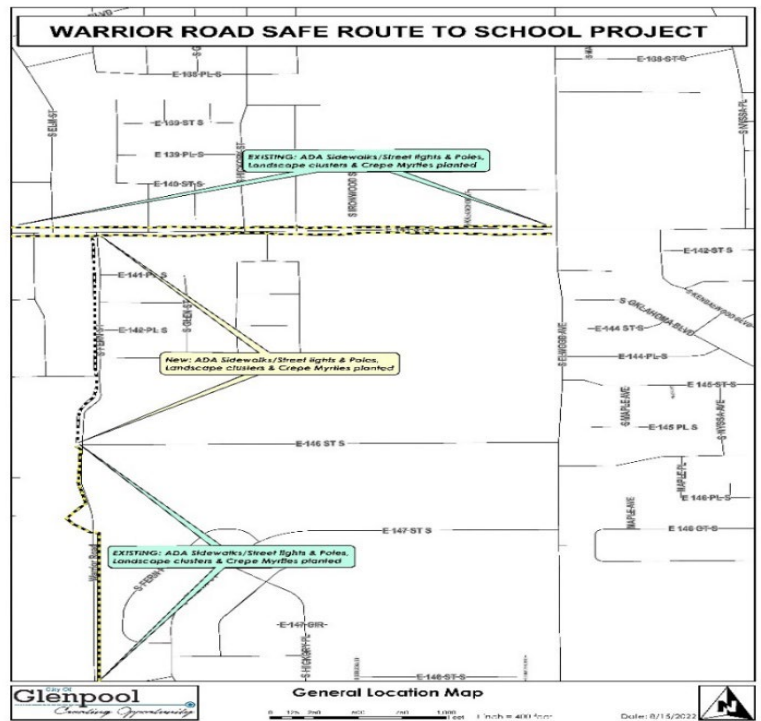
The Warrior Road Project aims to construct a sidewalk from 146th to 141st Street, covering survey, environmental, geotechnical, and engineering studies, culminating in final design and project plans.

- Urban Funding Agreement received from ODOT.
- Kimley Horn was selected as consultant.
- City match: \$119,920 - paid.
- Contract signed by Kimley-Horn
- Awaiting Notice to Proceed.

Sidewalk & Beautification Phase II Project JP#28845(05)

Construction of 2 miles of sidewalks linking Glenpool School to the Glenpool Community Center along 146th street, Elwood Avenue, 141st street and Peoria Ave. Project includes installing decorative lighting along 141st street.

- Final plans and estimates received; under final review with ODOT.
- Transportation grant: \$550,800 (City match: \$137,700).
- Additional funding needed; applied for 2024 INCOG TAP grant.

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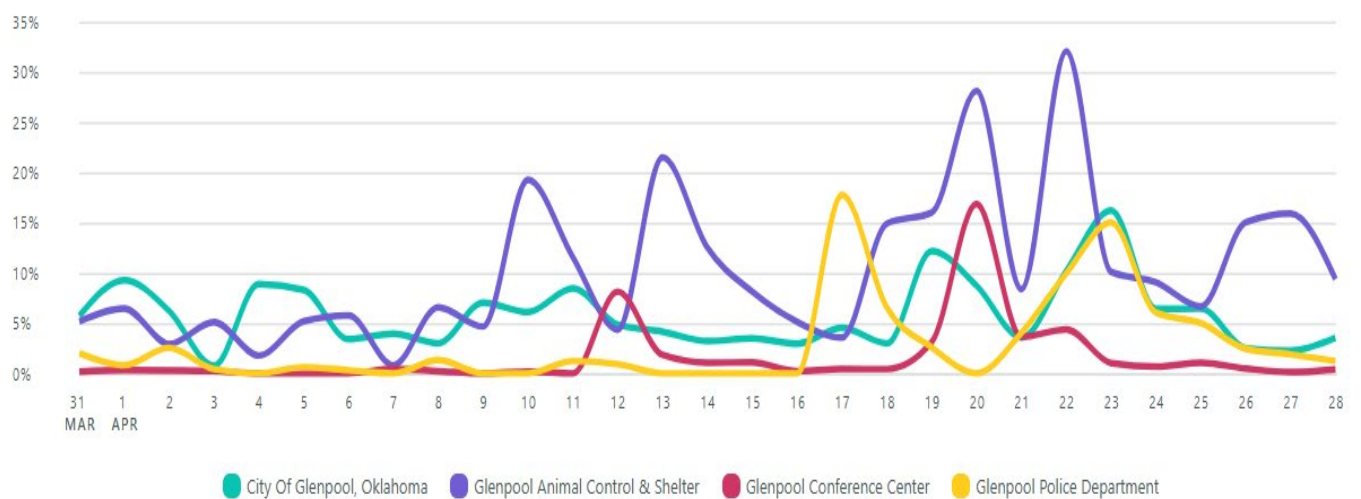
Publishing Behavior

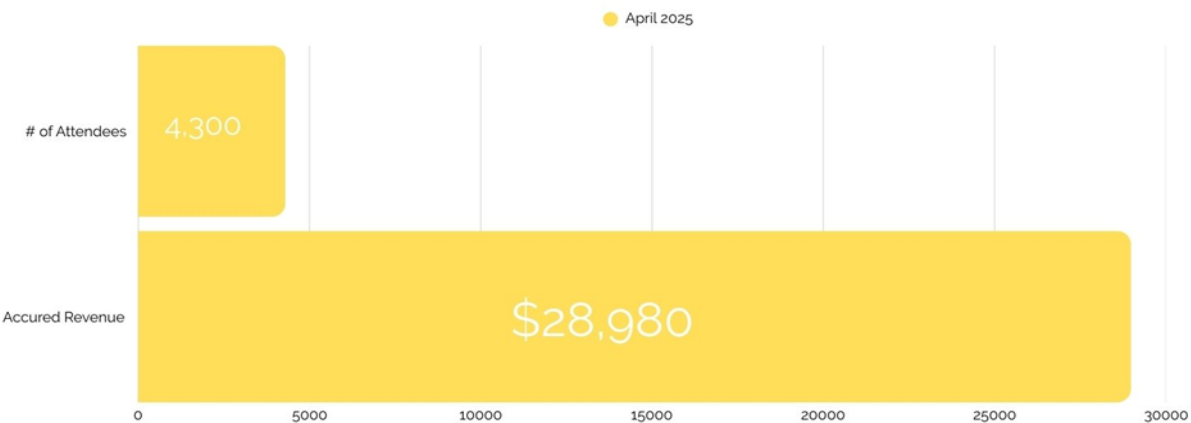
EVENTS TO HIGHLIGHT

April was another strong month, and we look forward to maintaining this positive momentum in the coming months.

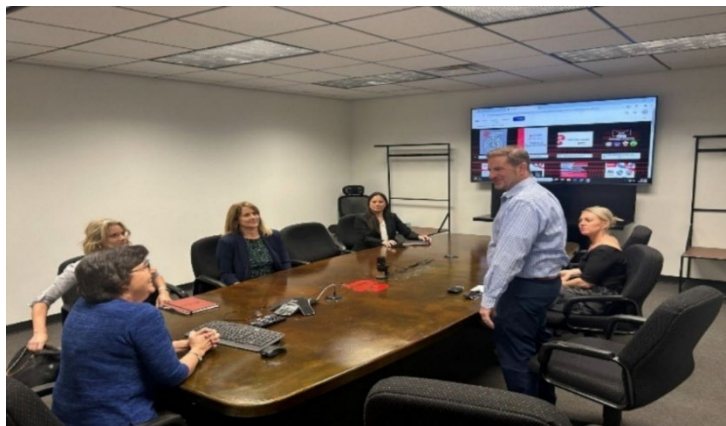




Economic Development/Grants

Economic Development

- Business, Retention, & Expansion (BR&E)
 - **Morning BREW:** The Glenpool Chamber of Commerce, in partnership with the Economic Development Department and Keller Williams, hosts monthly gatherings for local businesses, offering coffee, networking, and valuable resources. On April 17th, we welcomed 34 attendees. We heard from Sam Mulready, Field Representative for Congressman Kevin Hern, who shared timely legislative updates from Washington, D.C.
We also featured Vic Wheeler, Community President of Arvest Bank, who highlighted Arvest's local business support, unique culture, and range of services.
Both Sam and Vic took time for Q&A, which made for some great discussion and engagement. Our next Morning Brew will be May 15th.
- Oklahoma Innovation Expansion & Other Commerce Incentives
 - Over the last couple of months, I have met with qualifying Glenpool businesses to share information about the **Oklahoma Innovation Expansion Program (OIEP)**, which opened for applications on **March 31st** and closed on **April 11th**. During the application window, I reached out in person and/or via email to offer assistance and remind business leaders of the upcoming deadline.
 - The awards for **OIEP** are expected to be announced in early May, and with their permission, we look forward to highlighting Glenpool businesses that took advantage of this valuable incentive.
- New Business/Sites
 - Engaged with brokers who have property for sale or lease in Glenpool to assess interest levels and explore how we can assist, such as posting listings on LocateOK.
 - We met with a local property owner on April 9 to discuss his vision for the site, explore potential development ideas, and identify ways the City can provide support. A follow-up meeting with a potential partner for the property owner is scheduled for next month.
 - Responded to inquiry from a business owner interested in opening a retail location in Glenpool; facilitated connection with a local community leader in a related industry to support relationship-building and next steps.
 - Contacted by a real estate developer from Texas—referred through a connection at Commerce—seeking more information on available properties for a potential mixed-use development that would include retail.
 - Hosted the Tulsa's Future team on April 16 for a lunch meeting and economic development tour. The visit included an overview of Glenpool's ongoing efforts, a guided shuttle tour of high-potential



development sites, and a visit to a local manufacturer to showcase their products and allow time for Q&A.

- Met on April 17 with the owners of a new business concept interested in bringing an entertainment and dining venue to Glenpool. As a next step, we connected them with potential property owners to explore location opportunities.
- We are in the final stage of working with the broker representing the buyer for the Blue Compass site, with an announcement expected soon.

- **Travel/Training/Misc:**

- We have conducted a comprehensive review of economic development tools to identify the best fit for business recruitment, site selection and development, real-time tourism and hospitality insights, small business support, and competitive analysis. In partnership with the Conference Center, we have selected a tool and look forward to sharing regular updates based on the insights it provides.
- Met with a representative from OSU Institute of Technology–Okmulgee on April 1 to explore certificate programs and training opportunities available to support local businesses.
- Met with a new representative from the Oklahoma Manufacturing Alliance (OMA) to discuss opportunities for collaborative support of Glenpool’s manufacturing businesses and to learn more about the services offered through the organization.
- Met with Oklahoma State Representative Chris Banning on April 4 for an introductory meeting to get acquainted and discuss current legislation impacting our community.
- Participated in the Select Oklahoma meeting in Oklahoma City on April 8, which included legislative updates and a focused discussion on leveraging AI as a tool for economic development. Following the meeting, I also took part in an additional hour of hands-on training, where we worked in groups using community-based scenarios to develop effective questions for utilizing AI in informed decision-making.
- Attended the second annual *State of the Tribal Nations* event, hosted by the Tulsa Regional Chamber on April 15, alongside members of the city team. Representatives from the Cherokee, Muscogee, and Osage Nations participated in panel discussions focused on tribal leadership, economic development partnerships, and arts and culture.
- Attended the Glenpool High School Career Fair on April 24 and will be setting up a meeting with school leaders to discuss strategies for increasing local business participation in future events.
- Participating in the OU Economic Development Institute in Kansas City from April 27 to May 1, beginning the program with coursework in Credit Analysis and Real Estate & Reuse.

Grants: March 2025, Beth Miller (Grants – Special Projects Coordinator)

- STBG street widening grant (for Elwood) awarded last year from ODOT. The signed contract was received on 1/7/2025 and on 1/13/25, David A. met with developers. Awaiting bid process as of 3/31/2025.
- INCOG CDBG Grant approved on 12/2/2024 to repair a sinkhole at 145th and Kendalwood BLVD. Signatures were received from City and from County. Awaiting bid process as of 3/31/2025.
- OK Homeland Security State and Local Cybersecurity Program grant was approved 12/20/24. Able to replace the server at the PD by March or April 2025. Funds on hold by FEMA until further notice as of 3/31/2025.
- OK Homeland Security State and Local Cybersecurity Grant Program – next cycle due 2/28/25. Presented to Council the week of 2/24, declined 3/14/2025.

- FY 2025-2026 Transportation Alternatives & FY 2022-2026 CRP. up to \$1,600,000 (20% matching), Application in collaboration with David A. was submitted on 1/13/25, for completing sidewalk projects on Elwood and 141st, and Peoria Ave. Approved on 3/21/2025.
- Recreational Trails Program Grant 2025: 80% reimbursed up to \$300,000, with a total amount of \$375,000. This is for trails/parking lot/bridges at the new Morris Park Disc Golf and Nature Trails Park. Awaiting approval as of 3/31/2025.
- Opioid Grant 2025: Amount not specified. Next meeting with Mercy Mission II in April. Applications have not opened yet as of 3/31/2025, and projects are currently under discussion.
- DEQ - Collection Event Grant FY26: Application submitted February 28, 2025. Awaiting approval as of 3/31/2025.
- SAFE Oklahoma Grant: Amount not specified. We are working with GPD for equipment. Applications open in April 2025, and we are identifying the equipment needed.
- Keep Oklahoma Beautiful Roadside and Environmental Beautification grants were submitted on 1/27/25 in the amounts of \$3391.98 (for Welcome sign beautification) and \$962.45 (for seeds at Lambert Park). Grant approved in the amount of \$3700 on 2/26/2025, and check received 3/7/2025.
- AARP Community Challenge Grant submitted 3/5/25 in the amount of \$22,250.00 for a crosswalk with lights on 141st. Awaiting approval as of 3/31/2025.
- INCOG STBG FY 26 & 27 submitted March 14th: Three different projects in order of importance:
 - Elwood Avenue Widening Phase II (Construction of 141st and 151st intersections) in the amount of \$4,946,169.
 - Elwood Avenue Widening Phase III (Construction between 151st and 137th St.) in the amount of \$8,690,30.00.
 - Elwood Avenue Widening Phase IV (Design of 137th – 121st St.) in the amount of \$500,000.00
- FEMA Flood Mitigation Program Grant due March 14th. 75/25 match up to 2 million. Notice of Intent (to apply) was submitted through the FEMA.GO portal on Jan. 31st for \$1,597,362. This was rescinded by FEMA until further notice.
- OCEA grant submitted February 20th (was due 2/21) for \$808.98 Welcome Sign Beautification on HWY75/S Waco. Grant was declined 3/26/2025.

Special Projects:

- Next Events Committee Meeting 4/30/25.
- Farmers Market
 - 1st Annual Vendor Meeting was held on April 6th. The turnout was over 65 attendees and was very successful. It proved to be of great value to the city and to the vendors. This will become an annual event. Speakers present were from OK Dept of Agriculture and Cherokee Nation WIC programs. SNAP Training was conducted for vendors.
 - SNAP acceptance is NOW AVAILABLE! The processing machine was received on March 7th. Training is undergoing week of April 28th as well as Incode receipt processing training.
 - FIRST FARMERS MARKET MAY 3rd with over 55 vendors signed up already.

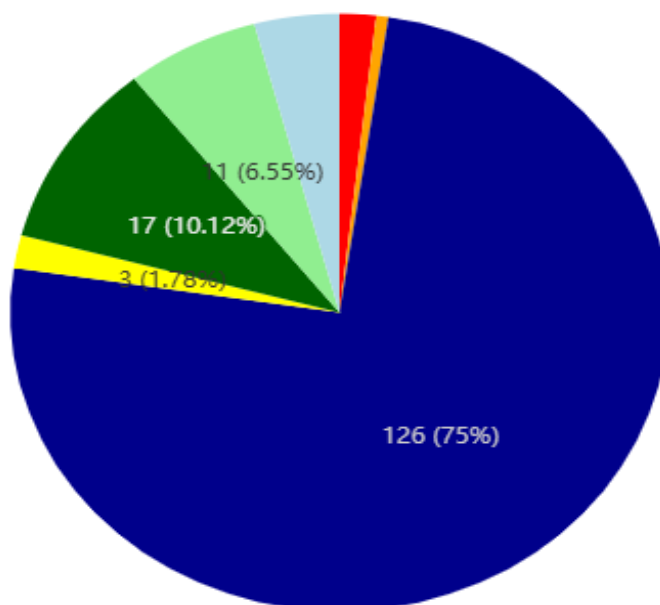

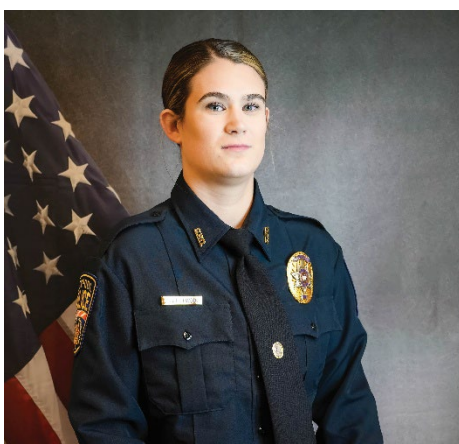
The communications division is currently two positions short and are actively accepting applications. That division has two recent hires in FTO.

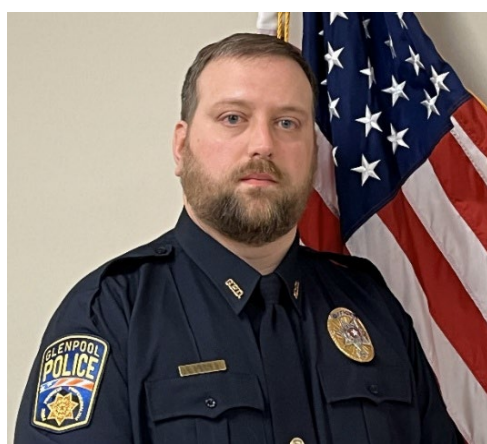
